Feed Back

Feedback from students : Student feedback is taken from the students who have attended 75% of the lectures on the performance of individual teacher of all the departments. The criterion on which feedback is taken include 'Time Sense' i.e. punctuality, regularity adherence to time schedule etc. Students also give feedback on 'Use of the teaching aids', 'Command on subject' and 'Helping Attitude' of the teacher. The Feedback was taken from students on the teacher's performance. The students were found to be highly satisfied with teachers teaching them. Less than very satisfactory feedback if any on any criteria is conveyed to the concerned teacher so that he/she can take the corrective measure. They were also very happy with the facilities provided to them in the college. They suggested that an auditorium should be built in the college. The students have a perpetual complaint of the college gate opening facing the village Burail.

<u>Feedback from the Alumni</u>: The feedback was taken with the help of questionnaire. The alumni appreciated the progress made by the college in academics and co-curricular aspects. They also suggested about the new courses that can be started in the college. They felt that the college should build an auditorium. The Alumni Meet is held in the college regularly.

Feedback from the Parents : Feedback was taken from the parents with the help of questionnaire. The parents were happy with the progress shown by their wards. They expressed their satisfaction with the infrastructure and the facilities provided by the college to the students. They felt that the college should start more vocational and post graduate course in the college. They expressed their displeasure at the garbage bins placed on the both side of the college and urged the college authorities to take-up the matter with the Chandigarh Administration and find a solution to the problem. They expressed their happiness at the initiative taken by the college to celebrate Mat-Pita Santan divas.
